#### **Premier's Debating Challenge 2021**

Last week four of our year 6 students, Allira, Emily, Asha, and Bella, travelled to a local school to compete in their first debate. The girls made an effective case for why homework should be banned from kindergarten to year 12 and successfully convinced the adjudicator, which resulted in a win for our team.

They argued that homework takes up too much of our valuable after school time, contributing to the increase in Australian obesity and causing students who are already struggling in school to develop mental health issues such as anxiety and depression.

The girls spoke about the disadvantage for students who do not have a parent/caregiver with enough free time to help them, and when the opposing team suggested that teachers could assist during class time our speakers quickly pointed out that teachers have 25 other students to help.

They also reasoned that homework isn't worth doing because only reviews work that students have already learnt in class.

A fantastic effort from the debating team, who represented themselves and Erina Heights Public School with pride. The only thing left for them to do is take the case to their teacher.

#### **Our Hoot's Hero Focus is:**

#### **Takes Time to Produce Quality Work**

Here are some ways you can help your child develop this skill.

Encouraging your child to care about what they are doing and to put in their very best effort often children rush work in order to "just get it done." Let them know that taking care, planning and doing their best are essential skills needed to accomplish things, not only at school, but life in general. Show them how you produce quality work in your everyday life (e.g. cooking, cleaning the car, in your own work).

Supporting your child to take pride in their own work and achievements - when children produce quality work, you can see the pride in their faces. Talk to them about how good it feels, perhaps giving examples from your own life. Often when children feel this sense of pride they want more and put in their best effort so they can experience it again.

Encouraging your child to improve as a student at least a little bit every day - setting small, achievable goals will help your child focus on producing quality work. It could be something as simple as "today I am going to stay in the lines when I write" or "today I am going to do my spelling in my neatest handwriting." Little achievements help to build up that sense of pride.

Showing your child how proud you are of them - children love to know that an adult is proud of them, they often need this validation before they can feel proud of themselves.

Explaining to your child the purpose of the work they are doing - sometimes children think "what is the point of this?" Help them find the purpose in what they are doing by discussing it with them. By understanding how completing an activity will benefit them, now and in the future, children are more likely to take the time to produce quality work.

The 2021 Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC) opened on the 1 March and runs until the 20 August, 2021. This challenge is free for students to participate in and promotes a love of reading. Your child's Department of Education (DoE) username and password are used to logon to the PRC portal. These are the same details a student would use to access the student portal and computer network at school. If you're unsure of these details, please contact your child's classroom teacher.

Kindergarten and Stage 1 students are reading some of their 30 Premier's Reading Challenge books as part of their Library lessons. These books will be recorded on the PRC site by Mrs Schofield, however, they are also encouraged to participate in this great scheme at home. Students in Stage 2 and 3 are required to read 20 books (15 from the PRC book list and 5 free choices). Successful students will receive a certificate signed by the Premier of NSW.



#### **Reconciliation Art Workshop With Maddy And Bek**

We are very excited to have two strong Aboriginal women sharing their artistic skills and cultural knowledge with our students on Thursday June 3. Students from Kinder to Year 6 will be participating in some cultural talks about ochres, rock artworks and learn some words in language. Then they will get to paint their own art pieces with help from our artists, Bek and Maddy. Below is a little bit about these artists.

#### Bek

Bek is a mother of 2 children here at Erina Heights Public School and is a proud Aboriginal woman from the Wiradjuri tribe located near Dubbo. Even though she is living off country, it has been her home for the majority of her life. Here on the coast, Bek has been involved in numerous cultural activities here on Darkinjung land and is passionate about teaching and sharing her knowledge of the Aboriginal culture.





#### Maddy

Maddy is the artist behind Kapata Dreaming (<a href="https://kapatadreaming.com/">https://kapatadreaming.com/</a>). Some of her artworks are displayed throughout the coast including Wyong Hospital's Emergency Department. She was born on the Central Coast, the lands of the Guringai and Darkinjung people. Her cultural connection is through her Mother, a Wirajduri Wangaaypuwan Woman.

Maddy was blessed to grow up with many cultural influences such as her mother Sharon Hodgetts, her Nan Anita Selwyn/nee Shipp and her older brothers. As well as many other families members that value and practice our culture.

Living near Brisbane Water National Park and many cultural sites, Maddy grew up spending time exploring the bush and learning the stories with her Mother. They still regularly go bush together, where Maddy continues to learn culture.

Maddy's love for painting began at a young age with her mother. They would paint Indigenous designs and stories together. She has a great appreciation and respect for her Family, Culture and Country. These are the things Maddy values and holds in her heart, this is part of her spirit in which is expressed though her art.

In literacy we have been focusing on writing persuasive texts, using an introduction and supporting paragraphs.


In math we are working on telling the time to the o'clock, half past and quarter past times. We are also getting learning the jump and split strategy for addition and subtraction.


We are enjoying learning about how music and sound impacts moods, how Foley artists make sounds for movies and how to use soundscape techniques using an online application from the Musica Viva resources.

### Parliament and Civics Education Rebate (PACER)

Students from our school will soon be undertaking an educational tour of the national capital. Students will be given the opportunity to participate in a variety of educational programs with a focus on Australia's history, culture, heritage and democracy.

The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australians being able to visit the national capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship education. To assist families in meeting the cost of the excursion the Australian Government is contributing funding of \$30.00 per student under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate program towards those costs. The rebate is paid directly to the school upon completion of the excursion.
