

KG

What a glorious start to Term 4 for KG! From the school concert, to learning many new concepts in class and participating in SiSA sport days. It has been a busy and exciting start to the term.

KG conquered their fears as they bravely performed in their first School Concert in front of our school community. Kindergarten's theme was Australia and through creative dance and drama they brought many iconic aspects of Australia to life. Teal said the following day that he was very nervous before he went on stage but was glad, he did it and cannot wait for the next school concert.

In English, KG have been writing some excellent descriptive sentences and recounts using adjectives. Our literature unit for this term focuses on the theme "Fantasy." So far, we have read and completed learning experiences based around the books, The Paper Bag Princess and The Gruffalo. Hanging up in our classroom, we have our recounts of the Paper Bag Princess. KG has used some awesome adjectives to describe the dragon. Students created their own Gruffalo/monster and enjoyed writing numerous sentences to describe it. KG has also been enthusiastically reading our new decodable books and we are learning to carefully sound out words when reading texts.

Since returning this term, KG has been learning about Whole Number, Money and Time in Mathematics. Students have continued to consolidate their knowledge of 2- and 3-digit numbers and some students are excited to start learning their 4-digit numbers. KG also explored the value of money and its use in society. Last week we learnt the days of the week, months of the year and explored the duration of events. Students also learnt about analog and digital clocks and how to read the time using the terms "o'clock" and "half past."

KG is exploring different materials and their properties in Science. We completed a science experiment last week where students were challenged to build a Lego house and decide which material would be the most useful as a waterproof roof. We then discussed why some materials worked better than others.

Every Friday, KG is so excited for their Gymnastic and Fundamental Movement Skill lessons with SiSA. Kindergarten is learning a range of new techniques through drills and games. The mini trampoline and rolling down the wedge mat have been amongst our favourite activities.

A highlight of this week was visiting our Life Education Van and meeting Healthy Harold. We learnt all about friendships and the kinds of things that good friends do for each other.

KG is a hard-working and enthusiastic class, and we cannot wait to see what the rest of the term brings.

Motivated Learner

Setting Goals and Working Towards Them

Science says 92 percent of people don't achieve their goals. Perhaps, most of them never learned how to effectively set their goals.

WHY should your children learn goal-setting?

- \cdot it teaches them to take responsibility for their own behaviours and learning
- \cdot it promotes a "can-do" attitude
- \cdot it forms a powerful lifelong habit

Here are some ways you can help your child develop this skill.

Get the Idea Across

Start the process by looking for ways that your child already uses goal-setting techniques. If you notice that your child has managed to save up their money to buy a video game, for example, discuss the steps they needed to take to get what they wanted. Talk to them about how good it feels to accomplish something that you've worked toward. Then, discuss how these same techniques can be used to meet other challenges.

Start Small

Help your child think of a fun goal they could achieve within a short time. Maybe they could finish a book they started or complete a craft project. Little goals are the best way to get kids moving toward big goals. Meeting a goal gives kids an incredible surge of energy.

Let Them Choose

As much as you might want your child to be awarded the Academic Achievement awards each year, it's best to let your kid decide what they want to achieve. Then you can help them make a plan. Obviously, some goals require more input from you. If learning to figure skate is your kid's dream, you're going to have to help them set and achieve their targets. If parents find they're nagging or getting angry that their child isn't working hard enough to meet a goal, that's a signal they need to pull back.

Be Alert to Possibilities

If your child says, "I wish I could win the public speaking competition in my class," use it as an opportunity to assist them in creating a plan. Help them write down specific steps. Then check in with them from time to time to help keep them focused on their targets.

Show Them How

Adults have a much greater sense of what it takes to accomplish goals so include your child in your own goal-setting to show her how the process works. Say you want to create a garden. Get your child involved in everything from researching plants to turning the dirt. Adults know how to break a goal down into steps, and that's something kids need to learn.

Provide a Reality Check

Children often underestimate how hard it can be to meet a goal, and then they get frustrated and discouraged when they fall short. If your child decides they want to play the guitar, for instance, be encouraging but realistic. Point out the challenges and the dedication it will require. The idea isn't to make the goal seem too daunting, but rather to share in the seriousness of the undertaking by helping plan it out.

Applaud Effort

As your child begins to set goals and work towards them, don't forget the compliments. Say something like, "I'm really impressed. When you care about something you really go after it!"

When Kids Fall Short

Your child wanted to improve in spelling, but they got 50% right on the latest test. Now what? Try these steps.

· Review the goal with your child. Maybe it was too vague or too ambitious.

 \cdot Ask your child for suggestions. Children are more likely to follow through on their own ideas about what else they can do.

Help envision the benefits. Ask: "What do you think it will feel like to do better on the next test?"
Share your childhood frustrations. Your child might feel better when you tell them about your difficulties learning fractions.

 \cdot Compliment him. Even if your child doesn't get the 100% hoped for, make sure to praise them for trying ("I'm so proud of how hard you studied!").

 \cdot Threats or bribes won't work in the long term. Offering a video game in exchange for an A, or a punishment for a D, won't help your child's follow-through in the long run.

P&C Term 4 Update


